



2022 MGC Fall Seminar featuring LaBrenda Garrett-Nelson

LaBrenda Garrett-Nelson, JD, LLM, CG®, FASG, earned a BA from John Jay College of Criminal Justice, City University of New York, and both a Law degree and a Master of Laws degree from New York University. She enjoyed a 35-year career as a tax lawyer before her 2013 retirement as a partner from the big four Accounting firm of Ernst & Young, and is now a full-time genealogist focused on teaching and writing. She lectures frequently on standards and the proper documentation of genealogical work and proof arguments. She was elected as a Trustee of the Board for Certification of Genealogists® in 2016, and will end her third term as BCG President in October 2022. LaBrenda also serves as the Registrar General of the Sons and Daughters of the United States Middle Passage, a national Lineage society that honors ancestors who were enslaved in the United States.



In 2021, LaBrenda was elected as the 170th Fellow of the American Society of Genealogists (ASG), the field's honorary scholarly society. The ASG was founded in 1940 and is limited to fifty life-time members; election is based on the quality of a genealogist's published work. As explained in an ASG press release, LaBrenda "has a twenty-year record of writing family history, first as a dedicated amateur while practicing law, and then, since her retirement from that profession, as an authoritative writer and genealogical educator. Her compiled genealogical scholarship in journals such as National Genealogical Society Quarterly focuses on African-American families during and after enslavement, including combining DNA match evidence with traditional documentary evidence in a notoriously difficult field. Her educational publications include a guide to researching African-American family history in Laurens County, South Carolina, where she has roots—a primer with important methodological lessons applicable nationally—and an authoritative guide to genealogical research in the state of Alabama. Institutions such as county courthouses, libraries, and government agencies have all kinds of records and information that should be helpful in your genealogical research. They are usually quite happy to help you; however, remember that the people in these offices are probably very busy. It's best to keep your letter concise and business-like. Also, keeping track of who you write to and what you ask for is a good idea. This way you won't repeat your efforts unnecessarily. We'll go over some helpful tips.

Historical and genealogical societies come in all shapes and sizes. You'll find them at the local, county, state, and national levels. All of them offer a variety of activities and resources. A genealogical society represents years of genealogical research experience. If you're having trouble with a specific problem, the staff or members may be able to offer hints to help

you out. It's likely that someone else in the group has already been through the same problem. Many historical and genealogical societies work to preserve records and other materials of historical or genealogical interest in their location. Some maintain libraries of their own where you may do research, and others donate their work to local universities and libraries. Societies with their own libraries often have a good collection of local history and local family histories. Contacting a society in the area where your ancestors lived may lead you to a book about your family, and can be a good way to learn where important information may be stored. This topic tells you how historical and genealogical societies may help you in your research.

David E. Rencher is employed as the Chief Genealogical Officer for FamilySearch. A professional genealogist since 1977, he is one of the rare few who have earned both credentials: Accredited Genealogist[®] with ICAPGen in Ireland research (1981) and Certified Genealogist[®] with the

Board for Certification of Genealogists (2006). He is the Irish course coordinator and instructor for the Institute of Genealogical and Historical Research in Athens, Georgia, and the Genealogical Research Institute of Pittsburgh in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. He graduated from Brigham Young University in 1980 with a BA in Family and Local History. He is a past-president of the Federation of Genealogical Societies (FGS) 1997-2000, he is a past-president of the Utah Genealogical Association (UGA) 1993-1995 and a Fellow of that organization. He is a fellow of the Irish Genealogical Research Society, London. He is the past Chair of the joint National Genealogical Society and International Association of Jewish Genealogical Societies committee for Record Preservation and Access; he serves as Director on the board of the National Genealogical Society and as a Counselor for the New England Historic Genealogical Society.

While it is widely known that genealogy research by using the internet is only the tip of the iceberg, that most research is done in libraries, archives and courthouses, we will try to share some sources that you may have never heard about or used. Be sure to visit each suggested link - you never know what you may discover.

WorldCat

Website: www.worldcat.org

Description:

WorldCat is the world's largest network of library content and services. WorldCat.org lets you search the collections of libraries in your community and thousands more around the world.

You can search for popular books, music, CDs and videos - all of the physical items you're used to getting from libraries. You can also discover many new kinds of digital content, such as downloadable audiobooks. You may also find article citations with links to their full text; authoritative research materials, such as documents and photos of local or historic significance; and digital versions of rare items that aren't available to the public.

Because WorldCat libraries serve diverse communities in dozens of countries, resources are available in many languages. They also offer an **Ask a Librarian** service for assistance with your genealogical research projects.

To use this service at your public library, a valid library card may be necessary to access this site, inquire about this service at your local information desk.

Library of Michigan

Hello from the Library of Michigan! We bid farewell to Summer and begin our Fall journey. Football games. Tailgating. Pumpkin spice, and much more. At the library, the migration to the new catalog is mostly complete. When you visit www.answercat.org, you will go to our new library catalog site. It is a continual work in progress as errors are fixed. Also, you can begin to send in your application for a digital e-library card using the Get a Library Card Form on our website. A new display was recently put up by the Capitol Historian, Valarie Marvin. The display is called: The Transformative Harriet Tenney: Pioneering Librarian as well as Michigan's first female state officer and state department head. Aspects of the display can be found in different areas of the library. A digital kiosk on the second floor points out the display locations.

Below are a few interesting new to us books that are in the Michigan Collection at the Library of

Michigan. There are many more wonderful books available at the Library of Michigan covering Michigan History, People, and Places. If these books are not available at your local library, try using the interlibrary loan service called MeLCat. Your local public library will be able to help you request one of the books.

- Annual Reports of the Village of Kalamazoo, 1882. The researcher can locate information on the officers and committee assignments. There is a lot of detailed financial data from different sections of the village such as Streets and Bridges, Fire and Water, and Public Grounds.
- Wartime Memories that Last Forever by Howard Umbarger. This is a personal account of the author's life in World War II. He discusses basic training, deployment, and his time as a POW.
- 100th Anniversary, St. Matthew United Church of Christ, Adair, Michigan: 1899-1999 by congregation, 1999. Several different records have been transcribed in this book. There is every 2name index to the translated records of the first evangelical church, Adair, Michigan. Baptismal records from 1902-1924. Confirmation records from 1903 – 1921. And both marriage and funeral/death records. A trove of family history information.



Maine Families in 1790 / Maine Genealogical Society / 12 vols. to date

Volume 12 of Maine Families in 1790, edited by Joseph Crook Anderson II and published by the Maine Genealogical Society in 2021, is an essential reference source (12 volumes to date) for early Maine families at the time of the first U.S. Census. The complete set is available to researchers as part of the Abrams Foundation Historical Collection at the Archives of Michigan (Call number: F 18 .G7 1988).

The ambitious goal of the series is to document all of the families living in Maine at the time

of the 1790 census, and with the completion of the twelfth volume, more than 3,000 families and nearly eighteen percent of the total number of Maine households have now been published. Researchers should note that during this time period, Maine was still part of Massachusetts, not attaining statehood until 1820.

Each family entry contains the name and 1790 census citation of the head of household, together with genealogical information and supporting documentation for the members of those families. Researchers are referred to other sources, including earlier volumes of the Maine Families series, vital records, probate files, local histories, and much more. Many family entries also include additional background information and context to the genealogical data provided by the contributor.

If you have Maine/Massachusetts families at the time of the 1790 U.S. Census, this ongoing series is certainly worth a closer look!

The Abrams Foundation Historical Collection, one of the larger genealogical collections in the United States, contains published family histories, immigration resources, cemetery transcriptions, directories, county and local histories, military records and getting-started handbooks.

The resources emphasize states with strong historic and migratory ties to Michigan, including the New England region, New York, Pennsylvania, the Midwest states of Ohio and Indiana, and the Canadian provinces of Ontario and Quebec.

Free Genealogy Websites

There are 65 in this collection provided by Barbara Curtindale – first published in “News and Notes Of Gladwin County Genealogical Society, Inc. & Family Search Center Affiliate Library” in the May 2021 issue. 50th Anniversary of MGC, My memories of the past, 4th article

The MGC was organized in 1972. I have served as a delegate from 4 societies. Originally from North Oakland Gen. Society starting in 1977-1983, then from Gratiot Co. 1983- 200? replaced, but was a delegate locally and presently since 2008 from Harrison Area Gen. Society and Gladwin Co. Genealogical Society. There was never a time I was not a delegate from a given society since my first meeting in 1977. That's 45 years of continual service. The memories I have of positions held in the Council (many) and the events are pleasant and mindful of the changes that have occurred, both in the Library/Archives facilities and in the Council itself.

The Council began Seminars, and the agreement was, if a Host Society was found, they were to be held in different parts of the state each time to accommodate travel and a change of venue for more people to attend from different areas. Seminars were held in Colombiere Conference & Retreat Center near Pontiac/Clarkston, it was once a Jesuit Priest facility; Troy, Gaylord 1995, Livonia, Lansing, Flint 1991, Grand Rapids 1992 and 1997 ?, Grand Traverse (at Acme) 1999, Southgate (Down River Society) 1990, Novi 1989 (hosted by Huron Valley (Milford) and Lyon Twp.), among other locations. Lansing held more than one and of course the many held at the Historical Center Library/Archives/ Museum building. The Gaylord one was of instant memory as it was held at the Tree Tops Resort in Nov 1995, and we all woke up to a big snowstorm! At that one we had celebrated a 90th birthday of our dear delegate from Gratiot Co., Georgianna Peet Miller whom we took up with us for the event. It was a white-knuckle drive home for sure. Ruth Farr was at that time Historian of Council, and she did a nice posting of it in the History scrap books with

pictures of the snow. Those are presently housed in the Archives of Michigan so I can't access them to do other checking. I must rely on my aged memory. We were also a participating organization in the Great Lakes Conference held in Ft. Wayne, Indiana in August of 1994. Many thanks to past President of MGC, Kim Harrison for her hard work in the planning committee of this great event with reps of each of the surrounding states. I hope this can be done again.

We have had a great variety of speakers for our seminars over the years. The younger people may not recognize some of the names, but they were popular at the time and most ended up not only as speakers Nationally but authors of Genealogy help books. John Heisey; Paul Milner; Ernest Thode; Paula Stuart Warren; Gerda Bals (LDS Fam Hist. Ctr Salt Lake); Paul F. Smart (LDS Utah); Harold Frederic Powell, PhD.; Peter W. Bunce, Dir. of National Archives-Great Lakes Region; Dr. George Schweitzer; Curt B. Witcher, ACPL-Ft. Wayne, IN; Henry Z. "Hank" Jones, Jr.; Maralyn Ann Wellauer; Gary Boyd Roberts; Leland Meitzler; Cyndi Howells; Roger Joslyn; Diane Gagel; Arlene Eakle; Brenda Merriman, Ryan Taylor; Rene' Jette; many local speakers participated in giving sessions and they knew their stuff. This would be a long article if I named them all, so will not.

If you have never attended a seminar whether in person or now as virtual/zoom, you really need to try it. I find that no matter how many of our local, state, national etc. seminars I have attended I still learn things. I don't care if a lecture is marked a beginner, general or advanced ability session I will choose it for the topic and reboot my memory of something learned long ago and haven't used as I should.

There is always something to be learned no matter how smart you think you are. Just like the fact- there is no such thing as a dumb question, The

dumb thing is never asking it. Sometimes if YOU ask the question, it gets the answer for someone who is afraid to ask it. I will enjoy getting to do 'in person meetings' again but don't miss the long drive to Lansing. It's 102 miles each way for me. 

Liverpool Shipping Telegraph by Derek Blount

I have often wondered how I could find the outgoing ship manifest from England when the manifest incoming to America has no embarkation date. The outgoing manifest sometimes has more information than the incoming manifest. If you have a ship that goes back and forth across the ocean frequently with the same master, it can be hard to find the manifest you want. It is especially true if you cannot determine what kind of ship it was, sail or steam. Determining intermediate ports along the way is almost impossible.

I recently found in the British Newspaper Archive a newspaper that provides much needed information.

The Liverpool Shipping Telegraph featured a fascinating 'Dock Directory,' which gave details of docks across Liverpool, such as Queen's Dock and Toxteth Dock, listing the width and depth of the docks' entrances, their tide timetables, and the names of the ships and their masters currently docked. The newspaper also contained a segment entitled 'Vessels Spoken,' which featured details of correspondence with ships that were sailing.

With 'a circulation greater than the daily and weekly Shipping Papers of the district added together,' the Liverpool Shipping Telegraph was eventually merged with the Liverpool Journal of Commerce.

They have over 10 million pages from the 1700's to the 21st century. The Liverpool Journal of Commerce has over 495,000 pages. They also have several other newspapers that report similar information. Lloyd's list, Shipping and Mercantile Gazette, Liverpool Daily Post and the Liverpool Shipping Telegraph and Daily Commercial Advertiser are several others in the Archive.

Now if you had a ship named Snortblatt with a master of Henry Quickship you can find out a lot more about the pending voyage. You can search the ship's name or master's name and where they were docked and find the date of departure. The type of ship is usually noted and can give you an idea of the length of travel expected, whether by sail or steam. They also usually note the intermediate ports which give you an idea of where passengers might have stopped. Outgoing manifests usually indicate the port to which the passenger has paid to disembark. It could be Barbados, Jamaica, or any eastern American seaport.

It may take a little time but the wealth of information in newspapers cannot be underestimated. Outgoing ship manifests can be found in Ancestry, Family Search and Find My Past.
